Our prosecutor's office has brought charges in a similar case before. If it is a "hard tow"—meaning the tow truck is in complete control because the back vehicle is hitched up and the rear vehicle has no way to affect steering or braking—then merely sitting in the rear vehicle is not operating it. But if it is a "soft tow"—meaning the rear vehicle needs someone in it to steer and/or brake—then it is being operated on the roadway and is subject to all laws in regard to operating a vehicle on the road. Keep in mind that in the latter example, things done by the driver in the rear vehicle sill affect movement not only of his vehicle but the towing vehicle.
